Signs and Symptoms

- Behavior changes may include:
 - o acting quiet and withdrawn
 - o being stubborn or restless
 - o tantrums of sudden rage
 - o confusion
 - "o rinappropriate emotional responses (eg: laughter, crying)
 - o poor concentration or day dreaming
- Shakiness
- Sweatiness
- Headache
- Dizziness
- Pallor
- Increased Heart Rate
- staggering walk
- · uncontrollable crying episode
- slurred speech
- blank stare
- refusal to take anything by mouth

Treatment

- If you don't know what the blood sugar is, treat the symptoms.
- Give the child some quick-acting sugar such as:
 - o 2 4 glucose tablets
 - o 3 4 ounces of juice
 - o 6 ~ 8 ounces of REGULAR pop
 - o 6 8 ounces Milk
 - o If the child has difficulty drinking but is able to swallow, slowly squeeze cake icing (gel type) or glucose gel to inside of the child's cheek – even if the child resists. Rub the cheek gently to make sure sugar is being absorbed.
- Check the blood sugar 10 -20 minutes after treatment. If the blood sugar result is less than 80, or if the child still has symptoms, repeat the quick sugar treatment and blood sugar testing cycle until the child is symptom free and the blood sugar result is above 80.
- When the child feels better and the blood sugar result is above 80, give additional snack if next meal is more than 30 minutes away and/or if the child will be participating in active play/ sports following this low blood sugar episode.
- The child may return to class after the blood sugar is above 80 and the child is symptom free.
- · Notify parent as soon as possible
